Arvada, CO – Maestas Taekwon-do held its 28th annual Christmas Party on Wednesday, December 16, 2009. During it's nearly 3 decades the event has been filled with food, family and fun.

Again this year, Head Instructor Robert Pettijohn, IV Dan, announced the Color Belt and Black Belt students of the year. Brian Swetlic was named Color Belt Student of the Year. Brian has been active in the club for a number of years first as a Taekwon-do dad to daughters Meredith and Jocelyn and then as a student along with them. Black Belt Student of the Year went to Ms. Clare Langmacher, III Dan. Ms. Langmacher started Taekwon-Do with her son, Jesse, about 8 years ago. Beginning last September over 75 students competed in head to head patterns competition. On Thursday, December 10th the finals were held.
